Their injection of enthusiasm lifted our spirits and the first meeting at the Crowne Plaza Hotel was held on 5th October 2023.

And the rest, as they say, is history as anyone who attended the on-line AGM last September will remember the great job that Eilis, Jan, Ann and Rosemary did of announcing the venue of the NWR 2024 National One Day Conference. **September 14th 2024.** One of our group's husband, John, introduced us to his U3A Video group and they did a marvellous job of producing a short video clip for the AGM at very short notice. [Shame about the lip sync - but that was one of those annoying techie glitches that suddenly hit at the wrong time.]
